CAPP Launches *It's Their Right* PSA Campaign on TV and Web

CAPP, the only program in New York City that uses life-sized puppets to teach children how to recognize, resist and report physical and sexual abuse, recently

announced the launch of a new PSA Campaign, *It's Their Right*. The 30-second television spots and online videos focus on children's basic rights "to be safe," "to be strong" and "to speak up" and urge viewers to donate \$20 to educate one child on the prevention of physical and sexual abuse.

Celebrity supporters from the worlds of film and television have pledged their time and support to build awareness surrounding abuse prevention and raise important funds to ensure every child in New York City is educated on their right to be safe from abuse. The first phase of the campaign features Food NETWORK and HGTV Star Sandra Lee; actor and author Steve Schirripa, known for his role as Bobby "Bacala" in *The Sopranos*; and film and television actress Margaret Colin, who currently appears on *Gossip Girl* as Eleanor Waldorf. Future iterations of the campaign will feature additional supporters from film and television plus notables from New York sports, the food and wine industry and businessmen and women.

Shot by TIME WARNER CABLE'S NEW YORK CITY REGION and edited

by Jerry Heer and Nick Genchi, the 30-second spots will air on NBC New York and TIME WARNER CABLE'S NEW YORK CITY REGION during 2010. The F.Y.EYE DIGITAL SIGNAGE NETWORK will also air the *It's Their Right* campaign on screens throughout the tri-state area.

It's Their Right

- ◆ A child abuse report is made every 10 seconds
- ◆ 1 in 4 boys and 1 in 6 girls will be sexually abused before age 18
- ◆ More than 80% of all child abuse cases go unreported
- ◆ Nearly two thirds of the people in treatment for drug abuse reported being abused as children.
- ◆ 18,000 children are permanently disabled every year as a result of maltreatment

The Cost of Being Connected

Do you reply to text messages or emails from co-workers on your days off? Check your facebook page often? Panic when you leave your cell phone at home? Chances are, regardless of your generation, you have answered yes to at least one of these questions.

As the speed and accessibility of technology has increased, so too has our need for constant and instant connection with the people in our lives. And while this accessibility allows us to communicate in a more time-effective manner with family, friends, and co-workers, it also has a quiet way of edging into our lives, slowly and intrusively, blurring boundaries between work and vacation, friend and acquaintance, professional life and personal life. Those generations that can remember what life was like when you needed to look things up in a dictionary or encyclopedia, or had to walk to the nearest pay phone when the car broke down, can compare life before Internet and cell phone use became commonplace. But what are the implications for younger generations, who typically do not know of a world without

such “luxuries” that provide instant, constant communication and connection?

The prevalence and importance of technology for children and adolescents is indisputable. A recent report released by the KAISER FAMILY FOUNDATION indicates that children ages 8 to 18 are online an average of 7½ hours per day (this does not include 1½ hours of text messaging or talking on cell phones) and, due to multi-tasking, pack in nearly 11 hours of media use (*Generation M2: Media in the Lives of 8 to 18 year olds*). While multi-tasking may seem a more efficient use of time, research indicates otherwise. Brain scans of multi-taskers show slower responses when reverting back to uncompleted tasks, and, while there is more surface area activated in the brain, it is only indicative of superficial stimulation.

While the ability to multi-task has been a valued asset in the workplace for decades, research on the limitations and inefficiency of multi-tasking is starting to change this opinion. In the doomsday book *The Dumbest Generation*, author Mark Bauerlein discusses Generation Y, and their



inability to focus on one thought or task for an extended period of time. The absence of “linear” thinking, which is said to be the key to problem-solving, has been echoed in the recent *Frontline* episode “Digital Nation.”

Students and professors from MIT were highlighted in the episode, which gives the audience a visual image of the changing face of university education. The classroom is a sea of laptops, where the students have their facebook and twitter accounts open while taking notes, and have their cell-phones handy for receiving and sending text messages. The professors, one of whom claimed that he can no longer assign books

longer than 200 pages due to the short attention span of the students, compete with the Internet for their students' attention, and deliver their lectures with a type of song-and-dance routine. Along with their students, they see a pattern of thinking in "spurts," where good ideas come to them, they write it down in a nice paragraph, then go on to another task. Their resulting papers are a collection of thoughtful, well-written paragraphs that do not transition into each other or tie clearly into a common theme.

MIT is not the only example of this new need for entertaining education. Schools around the country are teaching in a more entertaining, interactive manner. THE QUEST SCHOOL, in Manhattan, has discarded traditional teaching methods, relying solely on educational, interactive video games for their lesson plans.

Horrified? According to Dossey, the "Age of Reason" learning, which focuses on the memorization of facts, competition among peers, and individual achievement, may have worked for centuries, but is now outdated. New technology has led to a "new" way of thinking and learning, which includes connectivity, collaboration and interaction. There is no need to memorize if one can look it up on the Internet, no interest in the internal satisfaction of individual achievement when validation can be instantly achieved through a text or facebook status, and no interest in competition when everyone gets a trophy for just showing up.

While there are negative aspects to the widespread use of technology, there are positive aspects as well. It helps us stay connected with family and friends who have moved away. It gives us access to information, from possible medical diagnoses to the recommended temperature to which to cook a turkey. Does immediate access to information outweigh the negative effects of our reliance on technology?

Stay tuned for the next issue of

cappNEWS, where we will explore the implications of our reliance on technology, including its effects on attachment and relationships. ■

Fontana and Dr. Mel Schneiderman, the FONTANA CENTER is dedicated to advancing the treatment of abused and neglected children through research, professional training, public education and advocacy. During *National Child Abuse Prevention Month* in April, CAPP joined our long time partners to present the *Child Safety Workshop* to children in foster care, their foster parents, and social workers.

Approximately 20 children and 10 foster parents participated in the workshop. The children watched the presentation with their social workers and interacted with the puppets and Prevention Specialists on issues of safe and unsafe touch. Their foster parents watched a separate presentation in another room and engaged in a discussion on the challenges, concerns, and rewards of caring for children in foster care.
